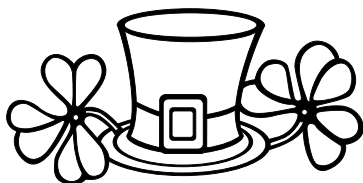
Happy Teachers

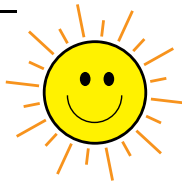

All of our preparation in the fall will soon pay off. Tulips, daffodils and other bulbs are starting to bloom. Blue iris are coming back now. Azaleas are gorgeous here in the Houston area, and the trees are blossoming and turning green once again. The natural cycle of life is renewing all that has been dormant all winter long. **Spring** in Spring, Texas, is glorious!

March Gardening Tips

- Evergreen trees such as hollies and magnolias will drop many leaves, some yellow. They are simply shedding old foliage, and it's natural; no cause for alarm.
- Feed all plants except azaleas, which can be fed after flowering.
- Put tomato plants in.
- Pinch tips of nonblooming perennials to encourage bushy growth.
- Remove tulips after flowering. They won't flower again in our region.
- Don't prune pines in March or April; they tend to bleed more now than at other times during the year.

Congratulations are in order for Sundance Earthscapes, Inc.

As a result of Sundance's diligence, hard work and conscientious attention to detail, another contract has been executed retaining their services extending through February of 2008. The CF Fund, Inc., Board of Directors unanimously opted to renew their expiring contract based upon review of a 3% increase, satisfaction with past performance, and their agreement to take on maintenance of lighting within the parameters of the maintenance specifications.

Sundance Earthscapes, Inc.

As reported last year, Scott Vann has been involved in every aspect of the landscape/nursery industry since 1979. He is a longtime resident of Spring and having attended Klein schools, takes great pride in the community. Scott has a reputation as a native plant specialist and this, combined with his experience, hands-on approach, and intense interest in horticulture, provides a great benefit to the community and complements the directors' goals for Champion Forest.

One of Scott's first reflections on Champion Forest pertains to his knowledge and understanding of the beautiful trees that grace our esplanades, which he has observed mature

over the many years. While he identifies their obvious beauty and health as ecologically important, perhaps his recognition of their investment – being synonymous with Champion Forest and our community – is what is most poignant. With this in mind, Sundance instituted a maintenance schedule that allowed for pruning of our mature trees, as evidenced for the first time last year, in an effort to protect Champion Forest's beautiful investment.

Along these same lines, Sundance continues to preserve Champion Forest and recently donated a portion of the plantings and upgraded the drip system on the Brampton Court Esplanade Beautification Project. Also, this week at their own expense, Sundance relocated and donated six Savannah hollies on Esplanade 20 near the bridge by the Temple on Champion Forest Drive.

This type of effort and commitment, along with Sundance's proactive manner of recognizing and recommending economical solutions to difficult decisions regarding maintenance and their ability to work among the various groups, has earned them very positive recognition over the past year. Sundance is fast becoming a valuable asset and a superb working partner within the Champion Forest community. As we continue to make strides in protecting and preserving Champion Forest as the premier subdivision it was designed to be and Sundance continues to showcase its own

abilities, it is hoped that this relationship will continue to thrive and be mutually beneficial.

Partnering for Positive Results

Additionally, uniting with other various groups has proven instrumental. As one small example, last month a vendor delivering a dumpster to a construction company on Cypresswood inadvertently drove over one of the esplanades, causing deep ruts and possible damage to the irrigation system located on this esplanade. Lt. Finley of the Harris County constables was notified, took down the relevant information and followed through on communicating with the builder. Meanwhile, Sundance was made aware of the situation and was dispatched to the location and checked the operation of the irrigation. Suffice it to say, the professional manner in which all was orchestrated and documented prompted the builder to fill in the ruts and resod the area. No damage was observed; thereby, no costs were absorbed by the community and officially this area is back in order for the new homeowner to enjoy in the very near future. We would like to thank **John Slatterly**, custom builder, for his respectful diligence, along with all of our working partners who assisted in this endeavor.

As we move forward, this sort of teamwork, attention to detail, and patient understanding not only promotes our community, but also builds efforts geared towards taking possession of the community we call home. **Thanks to all for yet another wonderful start to 2007.**

CF HOA Annual Meeting

The CF HOA recently held its annual meeting and would like to thank those residents who attended. A PowerPoint presentation outlining the activity of the past year was prepared by **Rozann Janek** and **Ross Richardson** and presented to homeowners in attendance. The presentation, along with all financials, are now available on the CF website for those residents who were unable to attend. If you do not have Internet access and would like a copy of the financial reports, please contact **Stella Walleck** of Consolidated Management Services (CMS) at 281-296-9775.

The year's highlights include:

- Re-election of **Roy Arthur Riley**, **Rozann Janek** and **Cristy Hayes**.

- Deed restriction passage in five of the ten Champion Forest sections. Efforts continue.
- Creation of a new garbage survey in order to provide the PUD with information for negotiation of the garbage contract. The survey production was paid by the CF Civic Club. A portion of the survey postage was paid by the CF PUD.
- The Brampton Court Esplanade Beautification project was completed with the support of Sundance Earthscapes, Inc., and donated dollars from area residents.
- The ongoing legal battle and expense involving two homes in longtime disrepair came to a close and positive resolution.
- A new management company, Consolidated Management Services, came on board.
- The CF website was enhanced, in order to become more useful to residents. Advertising space on the site is now being sold and will help offset monthly website expenses.
- Most irrigation problems on area esplanades have been resolved.
- The new CF landscaping company has trimmed esplanade trees in order to increase visibility and aesthetic appeal. Tree trimming was part of the services negotiated with

the company when initially hired and not an additional expense incurred by the CF HOA/Fund.

- The initially denied insurance claim for the repair of the fallen brick wall along Champion Forest was eventually paid after further inspection and correspondence from CF HOA President and resident engineer **Roy Riley**. The Board agreed to send letters to residents adjacent to the existing walls, regarding the removal of trees that may cause the walls to become vulnerable to future storms.

The goal of the Champion Forest Fund's discussions regarding the detailed summary report in the monthly newsletter attempts to find a fair balance between the "right to know" and the "right to privacy." The Champion Forest Fund, as a corporation, is consulting with its attorney in order to determine its role and responsibility. Security Report March 2007

Security in Champion Forest is going very well. The same cannot be said about other areas close by. There are still some problems in the Cypresswood/Stuebner Airline area. Kuykendahl is having a rash of problems with graffiti and gangs.

We need to always keep guarded against problems/conditions that can affect our security. For example, there was a situation where someone stopped for a traffic light and was not paying attention to the surroundings. Next thing that happened was someone was tapping on the auto window with the barrel of a gun. On another occasion two persons got into an auto in the 1960 area, failed to lock the doors and were talking when someone opened the door with a gun in hand.

When you enter an auto in a parking lot, please lock the doors, start the engine and get out of there. Find a safe place to talk or visit; the store parking lot is **not** one of them.

You must be aware of your environment at all times. If you know who is around you and what they are up to, you are in charge. Otherwise you are at risk!

Another crime that often happens is being followed home from the store and robbed in your driveway. This can only happen if **you** allow it to happen.

You may have gone to a bank, grocery store or the mall. When you leave the parking lot, look in your rearview mirror and note the make of the auto behind you. When you turn

off the main avenue into your subdivision, again, check your mirror. When you turn onto your street, again, check. If you have seen the same auto three times, it is time to drive to Precinct 4 on Cypresswood or other safe place. **Don't go home.** That's the rule of 3.

I received a phone call from a resident about an 18-wheeler selling surplus Thomasville furniture. **That is a scam!** Thomasville doesn't sell furniture from any truck. Lt. Finley says that some folks buy from them, and that is why they are in our neighborhood. You may be buying stolen furniture. I remember ordering a chair from Sears some years ago. It was to be delivered in four weeks. After six weeks we called and were told that we had to reorder because the furniture truck had been hijacked. We went to see the money man and got one that night. **It happens...**

I received another call from a resident on Herts saying that someone was soliciting at 8:30 p.m. I wish we could enforce **no soliciting**, but there is not a law that applies. However, if a suspicious person comes to your door, the dispatcher will be glad to have him/her checked out.

In today's world, with all the auto alarms, kill switches and chips imbedded in car keys, it is easier to hijack an auto with the motor running than to steal one that is locked. So be careful in your auto. Do not open your windows or doors for anyone. Be especially careful when getting gas.

KISD Offers International Business Academy

The Klein ISD International Business Academy will open in August 2007. This magnet program for students from all attendance zones will be housed at Klein Forest High School.

Enrollment is open now until February 9 for incoming ninth grade students who have a strong interest in international business studies. Admission to the program is limited, and will be by selection only. A new grade will be added each year until it is a four-year program.

Students will complete the high school core curriculum of 24 credits with additional academic courses that emphasize business, foreign language, and global culture. Students will have opportunities to participate in enrichment activities and community service projects, to visit businesses engaged in international commerce, and to interact with members of the community who work in the international business environment. Students in the International Business Academy are eligible to graduate under the Texas Distinguished Plan if they meet the requirements for advanced courses.

Klein ISD Makes Academic Progress

In the Klein ISD, 41,400 students are engaged in learning activities that result in the acquisition of knowledge and skills as prescribed by the state's curriculum objectives, the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills. Each year, students' academic progress is assessed by the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) to determine if they are meeting the state's standards. After students are tested, scores are released to the public that show the rating of schools and districts that are based on TAKS scores.

On the 2006 TAKS, the students of the KISD demonstrated that they are making progress in acquiring knowledge and academic skills. The students who are nearing the completion of their public school years take exit level tests. On 2006 TAKS scores on exit tests in mathematics and English language arts, data indicates that Klein students exceeded the regional and state averages and continue to show improvement. In comparison with the 2005 scores, students made a 9-point increase in the English language arts TAKS from 46%-55% meeting the Higher Education Readiness Component and a 5-point increase to 66% from 61% meeting the Higher Education Readiness Component on the mathematics TAKS. The district's exit test scores indicate an increased likelihood that Klein students are ready for higher education beyond high school.

On subject area assessments, Klein ISD experienced only one decrease from the previous year. Students, on the social studies tests, showed a decrease of 1 percentage point, dropping from 92% passing to 91% passing. In all subject areas, including social studies, the district met or exceeded the scores in Region IV (the greater-Houston area) and the state. Of significant importance is the district's providing instruction so that at-risk students are achieving academic success and that all other students are continuing to achieve, also. Among Klein students, the number performing at the highest level is growing. In 2006, 33% of KISD students


received Commended Performance on the English language arts tests. On the composite analysis of all subjects tested, 15% of Klein's students earned a scale score of at 2400, meaning that they correctly answered at least 91% of the questions. This increase is indicative of students' mastering the complete and comprehensive curriculum to the extent measurable on the TAKS test.

While students are preparing for this year's TAKS, administrators in the department of curriculum and instruction and building personnel continue to analyze the data of the previous annual assessments and from benchmark tests that are given at prescribed intervals. The goal of the analysis is to determine how instruction can result in students' acquisition of greater knowledge and the skills to apply what they have learned.

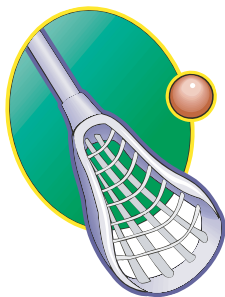

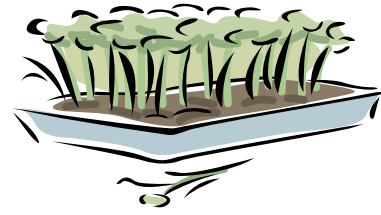

Architectural Control Committee guidelines for reroofing permit the use of Fiberglass Class A Asphalt Roof Shingles throughout Champion Forest Sections One through Ten provided they are one of the following heavyweight or super heavyweight laminated shingles:

- ELK Prestique I (30 Year) or Prestique Plus (40 Year)
Color: Weathered Wood, Sablewood, Antique Slate
- GAF Slateline (30 Year)
Color: Slate Green, Slate Gray, Slate Blue
- GAF Timberline (30 Year) or Timberline Ultra (40 Year)
Color: Weathered Wood, Charcoal, Slate, Pewter Gray

or one approved by the Architectural Control Committee. It is further agreed that these fiberglass asphalt roof shingles shall not be installed over existing wood shingles. The existing wood shingles shall be removed and 1/2" CDX plywood decking be applied prior to installing the fiberglass asphalt roof shingles.

Other approved reroofing materials include cedar shingles, hand-split cedar shingles, aluminum shingles, copper standing seam, slate, and certain tiles. Please note that an Architectural Review Application must be submitted and approved prior to commencement.
